TRIBE-SPECIFIC	1. No more than 50 pots per fisher and boat as of $11/15/2024$
	 Towing a skiff, or second vessel, with the intent of working additional sets of gear without the registered gear owner on board, is not allowed. Must have a valid treaty crab fishing ID card on person.
	4. Pots must be registered with the Lummi Natural Resources Department.
	5. Only standard commercial crab pots with two escape rings of not less than 4 $\frac{1}{4}$ inch inside diameter fixed on the upper half of the pot can be used. Each pot must have a 3-inch by 5-inch biodegradable cord panel (natural fiber, maximum thread size 120, or approximately 1/8-inch) or a biodegradable loop attached to the pot lid hook. Each pot must be attached to a surface buoy capable of floating with a 5-pound weight attached and clearly marked with the registered owners fishing ID number.
	6. Pots may not be harvested between one hour after sunset and one hour before sunrise.
	7. All gear shall be removed from the water by the closure of the opening. $$
	8. Mink is allowed to be used as bait only when placed in a bait jar or other containment device that does not allow the crab to access or consume the mink meat.
	 9. Mink meat should not be disposed in any areas with an open crab fishery. Mink may be disposed in areas closed to crab fishing or after a crab opening has closed. 10. In the event that weather or mechanical failure prevent safe removal of pots and harvest by fishery closure, fisher must immediately notify Lummi Law Enforcement at 360-312-2000, 360-312-2274 or 360-927-0165. 11. Must comply with all provisions of Title 10 of the Lummi Code of Laws.
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IN-COMMON RESTRICTIONS

IN-COMMON RESTRICTIONS: In addition to those restrictions above, the following restrictions, which all Region 1 Tribes are imposing for this opening,

notwithstanding any contrary provisions in their respective tribal codes, all apply: 1. Barging of pots will only be permitted up to 1 hour prior to the fishery opening and after the close of the fishery. It is prohibited to barge pots or tow boats for the purposes of hauling within 1 hour prior to opening and during the fishery. Only operational vessels with functional conventional pot-pullers shall be used for transporting or fishing crab gear.

2. Only 1 permit shall be issued per licensed fisher.

3. Each boat shall have 1 permit per boat, and no more than 50 pots. Zip ties issued by the Tribe's Fisheries Office may only be used when tags are not available. All tribes with a pot tagging system in place shall use the appropriate tags for this fishery.

4. At least one buoy must be clearly marked per pot with the vessel number of the boat fishing registered to that gear.

5. All boats must set their own registered gear at the beginning of the fishery and must pick up their own registered gear at the end of the fishery. During the fishery, not including the initial drop and final pick up, a boat may run up to two sets of gear in summer (prior to Oct. 1) and up to three set of gear in the winter (after Sept. 30) as long as the registered owner or operator of that gear is on board the boat working the gear. Any adjustment to the timing of the summer and winter seasons will be reflected in updated regulations.

6. The use of ground lines is not permitted during summer fishery.

7. All gear shall be removed from the water prior to the time of fishery closure, subject to two narrow exceptions. First, if gear cannot be lifted from the water prior to closure because of a mechanical failure, fishers must immediately notify Enforcement. Enforcement will document any breakdown including any gear lifted from or remaining in the water. Another boat or Enforcement may lift the pots but the gear may not be redeployed. Second, if winds are above 20 knots and it would be unsafe to transport the pots, the gear can remain in the water in non-fishing condition until it is safe to transport.

8. Fishers shall not have crab on board a vessel while recovering pots after closure of the fishery.

9. It is unlawful to have on board a vessel, purchase or attempt to sell a female crab or male crab less than 6.25 inches measure across the back in front of the horns.

10. It is unlawful to have on board a vessel, purchase or attempt to sell soft crab. 11. There shall be no crab in transit to a buyer more than 4 hours after the close of a fishery unless otherwise notified by the fisher to Enforcement for delays due to late closures, weather, or mechanical failure requiring transit of crab to occur 4

hours after the close of the fishery. Violation of in-common restrictions will subject to penalties in individual Tribal codes.

JUSTIFICATION This regulation is a Shellfish Implementation Plan paragraph 4.6 notice to proceed with harvest in the absence of a co-manager agreement for the 2024-2025 Region 1 Dungeness Crab Harvest Management Plan and is promulgated pursuant to Chapter 10.6 of the Lummi Law and Order Code.
